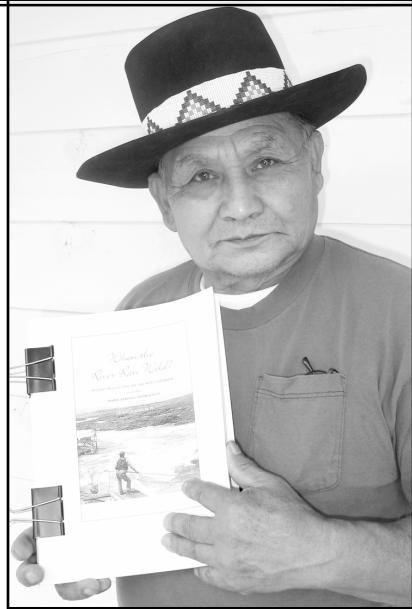

In this remarkable personal memoir and tribal history, we learn about the Kikislt-speaking Eastern Chinookans, who lived and worked for centuries connected to the rhythms and resources of the great fishing grounds of the Columbia River.

When the River Ran Wild! is the story of a culture and a community that has undergone tremendous change since 1805, when the River People encountered Meriwether Lewis and William Clark as they traveled down the Columbia River on their way to the Pacific Ocean.

George W. Aguilar Sr. is a Kikislt Chinookan who is a member of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs and works as a general building and reforestation contractor.
